Since its inception, Sewing to Comfort's mission is to give love filled, handsewn items to those in need of them. So far Sewing to Comfort has visited various communities, including Nursing Homes in Harlem and the Bronx; Pediatric Hospital Wards, Daycares, and Sheltering Arms.
